What is the grammar and language of our crime report?	
Formal language	Language used when writing or speaking about something important.
	The highwayman was arrested on suspicion of armed robbery and intimidating behaviour.
Informal language	Language used, usually when talking or writing to someone you are very familiar with.
	There are loads of trains and they blast their horn every time they zoom down the rails. What a lot of noise!
Standard English	The form of English that is used mostly in writing, using correct grammar:
	"Good morning. How are you? I'm pleased to meet you."
Non-standard English	The form of English, usually used when speaking to someone familiar. May use incorrect grammar and shortened versions of words.
	"Hey! Alright?"
Impersonal style	Formal, no personal pronouns (I, he, she, you). Often includes third person, present tense, passive voice. A witness, close to the landlord's family, claimed to hear the Highwayman discussing his plans with Miss Loveknot.
Passive Voice	A way of writing sentences that enables the writer to remove the subject of the sentence. Active voice: <i>King George's men shot the Highwayman on the highway.</i>
	Passive voice: <i>The Highwayman was shot on the highway.</i>
	by King George's men.
